### **Ordinary Time Sundays:**

### **Finding Holiness in the Everyday**



After the great feasts of Christmas and Easter, the Church leads us gently into what we call Ordinary Time. At first, the name might sound plain—almost dull—compared to the glory of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Yet, in truth, there is nothing "ordinary" about Ordinary Time. It is a sacred invitation to discover the presence of God in the quiet rhythm of our daily lives.

Ordinary Time is when the Church reflects on the life and teachings of Jesus—His parables, miracles, and encounters with ordinary people. These Sundays remind us that holiness is not confined to the spectacular moments of faith but is found in the ordinary duties of love, patience, kindness, and service. The green vestments of the season symbolize growth—spiritual growth that happens quietly and steadily, like a seed beneath the soil.

We live much of our Christian journey not in the glow of great feasts, but in the simplicity of daily living: cooking meals, working, caring for family, and facing life's challenges with faith. It is here, in these hidden moments, that we encounter the Lord most profoundly. St. Thérèse of Lisieux called this "the little way"—doing small things with great love. When we smile at someone in need, forgive from the heart, or pause to pray in the midst of a busy day, we bring God into the ordinary and make it holy.

As we approach the closing of Ordinary Time, the Church invites us to lift our eyes toward the fullness of Christ's Kingdom. The final Sundays turn our reflection toward the end times and the Kingship of Christ. It's a gentle reminder that all our daily efforts, sacrifices, and acts of love are leading us toward something greater—the eternal reign of Christ the King. The last Sunday of Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, crowns the liturgical year with hope and glory, proclaiming that Christ is Lord of history and of every human heart.

This transition also prepares us for the new liturgical year with the coming of Advent—a fresh beginning, a season of longing and expectation. Just as nature moves from green to the deeper hues of winter, the Church moves from daily discipleship to renewed anticipation of the Savior's coming.

So, as we gather each Sunday during this "green season," let us not think of it as a pause between great celebrations, but as a time of deep and steady conversion. It is the season when our faith matures quietly, nourished by Word and Sacrament, strengthened by community, and lived out in love.

Holiness is not found only in the extraordinary but in the faithful living of each day. Ordinary Time teaches us that every moment can become a prayer, every task an offering, and every encounter a chance to see Christ in others. As the Church year closes and a new one begins, may we continue to find holiness in the everyday—until the day all time becomes eternal in Christ our King.
